## What is a Living Wage?

**Public Policy:** "Minimum income needed for a worker to meet their basic needs."

Anker Definition: "Remuneration received for a standard work week by a worker in a particular place sufficient to afford a decent standard of living for the worker and her or his family. Elements of a decent standard of living

Include food, water, housing, education, health care, transport, clothing, and other essential needs, including provision for unexpected events."

WFTO Definition: A Living Wage is the compensation (remuneration plus non-monetary benefits) received for standard working hours (without overtime), which is sufficient to meet the basic needs of the individual and his or her dependents, and allow for some savings and/or discretionary expenditure. Elements of a decent standard of living include food, water, fuel, housing, education, health care, transport, clothing, savings and other essential needs.
