





Cut a sheet of cardboard of desired size.




 Cut 1/2 inch strips of cardboard and stick them. Measuring 1/2 an inch from the top and bottom of the board, stick the strips down.




 Every 1/2 Inch, make a mark at the top and bottom of board, and cut through them using scissors, until you reach strips.



 Wrap yam around the posts that you have created to form base of weave. Wrap yarn using movement demonstrated above.




 Begin to weave in other yearns.
 Alternate the over and under motion between each row.




Continue until bottom strip. Remove weave from board.





For this particular pocket, I only used 11 of the posts, and did not finish the weave to the end of the loom. This was so that I could create the size required for the bag. Once removed from the cardboard loom, ends should be tied and cut.






Two pieces of this woven fabric could also be stitched together to form a small side bag or bucket bag. Leaving the tassels loose gives it a more interesting look.





#### INSTRUCTIONS



Measuring tape, scissors, clasp tool or hook



50 mm jute cord or equivilent. 7m and 5m length (half length for beg handle)



Approximately 14 x 2 meter lengths, for each of the 4 colour yarns (helf number needed for bag)



Clasp with split



1. Fold both cords in half



2. Pull through clasp



3. Create loop with longer left hand cord



 Wrap 4 times around the cords and pull end tightly through loop created



5. Wrap longer left hand cord with yarn, approximately 6cm in length per colour, to 20cm from the end of cord



6. Bring the wrapped cord across the others



7. Take the longer right hand cord over the wrapped cord



8. Pull and knot tightly



9. Repeat process from the right, taking the wrapped cord over the rest



10. Bring the longer left hand cord over the wrapped cord



11. Knot tightly together



12. Continue knotting from left to right



 Stop when you reach the end of the wrapped part of the cord.
 Feed clasp through two middle cords



17. Cut 40cm of cord and wrap the middle (use cut offs)



14. Tuck the left cord under the folded middle cords, and bring the right cord over the top



18. Feed through the clasp



15. Wrap right cord 4 times around, top to bottom



19. Wrap ends together. Use clasp tool to thread yern end through to secure



16. With the clasp tool, feed remaining through the back 2-3 knots. Cut off all secure ends



20. Separate cord ends to create finge. Repeat process for second tassle



 Stop when you reach the end of the wrapped part of the cord.
 Feed clasp through two middle cords



17. Cut 40cm of cord and wrap the middle

18. Feed through the clasp

### Matte and Metallics, by Lillian Eve Sadeghi and Sigita Kaleth

Matte and Metallics is an exploration into natural fibres, contrasted with man made materials.

Whilst the matte trend has an earthy, neutral colour palette, metallics takes inspiration from nature's reflections and rippling water. Both trends use locally sourced materials, which consequently lead to their colour palettes. They share a theme of modernity, yet playfulness.





## PRIMARY IMAGES: MATTE - NATURAL FIBRES



















### MATERIALS NEEDED:

- cotton yarn
  Knitting needles or twigs or small bamboo sticks
- Bamboo
- pot of luke warm water
- bamboo cutting tools, e.g saw - nails
- -wood board
- Darning needle Garden twine or rope














### MEASUREMENTS TO KNIT BAG:

STEP 1: Cast on 74 Stitches and knit around 67 rows STEP 2: Knit (Garter stitch) 6 rows STEP 3: then knit one purt or one garter stitch depending on the opposite side (i.e. Purl stitch you knit on the back of the knilling sample and the garter (plain knit) stitch you knit on the front side of the knitting sample. STEP 4: After every 9 rows of stocking stitch, repeat this. (you can vary it to what you prefer)



## HOW TO MAKE: Knitting Garter Stitch

#### STEP 1:

 Create an e-wrap loop around your finger with the yarn

STEP 2: insert the right hand needle into the loop on the left hand needle

STEP 3: then place the strand of yarn in between the loop whilst your needle is in the loop from the left hand needle

STEP 4: then pull the right hand needle downwards through the loop and transfer the loop from left hand needle to the right









## HOW TO MAKE: PURL STITCH

STEP 1: Insert the right hand needle through the back of the top loop stitch on the left hand needle



STEP 2: place yarn in between loop stitch and knitting needles




STEP 3: pull right hand needle through the loop underneath



## HOW TO MAKE: CASTING OFF

STEP 1: insert the right hand needle from the back of the loop rather than the front of the loop on the left hand needle





STEP 3: then transfer the new stitch over to the right hand needle. Repeat this so you have two stitches on the right hand needle

STEP 4: then pick up the bottom stitch on the right han needle and place it over the stitch on the right hand need

## DARNING THE BAG TOGETHER








-Thread up the darning needle

















STEP 1: SEPARATE WIRE STUCTURE FROM THE METAL CAP.



STEP 2:
BEND THE WIRE STRUCTURE INTO THE FLAT SHAPE BY SPREADING
4 TWISTED WIRES AWAY FROM THE CENTER.

#### SINGLE SLIP STICH AROUND THE WIRE STRUCTURE

HOW TO:

1. Make a slip knot with around 3cm of the end of the yarn at the left,
Loop the yarn around your right forefinger. Carefully slip the loop off
Your finger. Holding the loop in your right hand, push the loop of the short end through the first loop.


2. PLACE THE SLIP KNIT IN FRONT OF THE METAL FRAME WITH THE YARN AT THE BACK.

3. INSERT THE CROCHET HOOK.

4. HOLDING THE HOOK WITH THE SLIP KNOT IN YOUR RIGHT HAND, AND THE YARN IN YOUR LEFT, WRAP THE YARN OVER THE HOOK.

5. DRAW THE YARN THROUGH TO MAKE A NEW LOOP AND COMPLETE THE STITCH THAT IS WRAPPED OVER THE WIRE STRUCTURE.

6. KEEP REPEATING SINGLE SLIP STITCH AROUND THE WIRE STRUCTURE.



## ATTACH THE EYELET TO SECTION E USING WIRE AND SINGLE SLIP STITCH

- 1. HOLD THE EYELET AGAINST THE STRUCTURE
- 2. START WITHT THE SLIP STITCH LOOP. INSERT THE HOOK INTO THE FIRST ROW OF STITCHES ON THE SECTION E
- 3. CROCHET 25 STITCHES AROUND THE EYELET THE AMOUNT OF STITCHES CAN VARY ACCORDING TO THE THICKNESS OF THE YARN
- 4. FINISH BY PULLING THE YEARN THROUGH THE LAST STITCH



#### GOLD WIRE ATTACHMENT

FOUNDATION ROW HAS 25 STITCHES




#### ROUND 1:


2 DOUBLE CROCHET STITCHES IN EACH FOUNDATION STITCH
JOIN THE RING WITH THE SLIP STITCH.

#### ROUND 2 AND 3:

I SINGLE SLIP STITCH IN EACH STITCH OF PREVIOUS ROW.
FINISH WITH THE SLIP STITCH THROUGH LAST LOOP.







CHANGE DIRECTION TOWARDS THE MIDDLE OF STRUCTURE

#### SECTION A :

START AT THE POINT 1 AND CROCHET SINGLE
SLIP STITCH AROUND THE WIRE TO THE POINT 2.
FROM THERE CONTINUE TO POINT 3.
FINISH SECTION AT THE POINT 3 BY PULLING THE YARN THROUGH
THE LAST STITCH.

SECTION B, C AND D: REPEAT THE ABOVE INSTRUCTIONS.

#### SECTION E:

START AT THE NEW POINT OPOSITE SECTION A POINT 3.

CROCHET AROUND THE LOOP CONTINIOUSLY AND FINISH BY PULLING THE YARN THROUGH THE LAST STITCH.











**Soft (Softly Does It) and Rough (Uneven Texture)**, **by Emily Powell and Daisy Filani**Inspired by everyday surroundings, the Soft and Rough trends highlight a fascination with the mundane. Whilst roughness was captivated by the textures of fruit, where as a result the palette stems from, the Soft trend reflects on everyday comforts and a sense of lightness.
Both trends come together through the skill of crochet and tassel making, which creates a connection between their contrasting textures.





### Step 1

### You will need..

















Put Crochet Hook through loop


Yarn over and pull through through to make another chain.

Make a slip knot

chain 3



Step 3 - Double Crock
Yarn over and put the crocke



when hook is through the circle yarn over



and pull it back through the circle



yarn over again so you have 4 loops on your hook



Pull the 1st loop through the next 2 loops. Leaving you with 2 loops on the hook



Yarn over and pull through the last 2 hoops.



Repeat Step 3, 12 times.



Once you have completed 12 double crochet's, slip stich in to the top of the 1st double crochet to secure.

# Step 5 - Building the sides.



Put the hook into the top of a double crochet.



Pull a new end of jersey thro









Yarn over and put the hook under



and in to the Double Crochet.





Pull the 1st loop under the 1'st loop. Repeat this until left with 1 Loop on hook



Repeat this step into every Double Crochet until you have reached 9 rows.





When the hook is in the Double Crochet, yam over again and pull that back through leaving you with 3 loops on the hook.



Finishing Off

#### The Tassel

#### The Handle





To make the tassel you wrap yarn around yarn.



wrap it tight so it stays in shape.





Join either end together



Cut the end to make them loose and comb out to make fluffy.





Follow step one for the base

of the bag, except chain 17 and then join it to the first look to create circle. Cut off end leaving enough jersey for you to knot the 2 ends together to secure and to attach to the bag.

All ends you weave in between holes and tie together to make sure nothing comes loose. Any extra long bits can be cut off.



### Step 4 - Extetending the circle.



To secure, Slip Stich into the top of the top of the 1st Double Crochet. Dont forget to miss out the first

Chain 3.

chain 3 you did.



Double Crochet into the top of every Double Crochet twice. This will leave you with 24 Double Crochets.





This is the base of the bag complete!









Wrap yarn winding around your fingers



Once enough has been wrapped for a tassel and with another piece of yarn tie the top of the windding. Cut the bottom of the yarn winding.




Wrap yarn from a yarn ball around your finger twice.



Pull the behind yarn in front over your finger and pull



Put the slip knot over the crochet







Pull yarn over so you will have two yarns on the crochet hook. Then pull through.



Continue doing the chain stitch 8 times



Pick up the first stitch in the chain



slip both of the stitches off with a chain stitch 2 times



Do a double crochet by first wrapping the yarn over the hook.



Take the yarn through the hoop and wrap around the yarn on the hook. You will now have three stands on the hook. Yarn over the hook and pull through two strands so you are left with two stands.



Yarn over the hook and pull through the 2 remaining strands. Repeat all the way around the hoop



Attach a paper clip to the top of the crochet



Attach the tassel that was made earlier and complete the double crochet.





Have a few paper clips to bend



Bend the paper clip so they are roughly straight



Twist the paper clips around each other



With one of the the paper clips wrap around the the h to create an earring



With a piece of cardboard



Once enough wern has been wranned



Cut the other and of the varn



With the top of the yarn winding



Wrap the yarn around the crochet hook, put the hook through the hoop so that the hook is infront of the hoop.



Take the hook behind the hoop to pick up yarn. You will now have two strands of yarn on your hook.



Yarn over the hook and pull through both strands of yarn.



Go around the hoop until all the wire is covered.
